<p>Item 1 – Welcome & Apologies.</p> <p>1.1 MY welcomed everyone to the meeting and gave apologies for the above.</p>			
<p>Item 2 – Chair’s Report.</p> <p>MY said that it had been another busy year for BRCC and much had been accomplished and many helpful contacts made in the community and within PKC, – the removal of the town centre traffic lights continues to work well for residents and for visitors and all have felt the benefits and once the flashing signs and audible crossing signals are installed, it will be much safer. – Likewise SN has made good on David Bailey’s vision of a safe access to the Cottage Hospital a reality. Not only are the lights up along with the associated road markings but an extended pavement ensures that patients and visitors have a safe walking access to the hospital entrance from the road. A great improvement and much appreciated by the users of the hospital. – The long running issue of an appropriate traffic calming measure at the top of Reform St is now in place and is being monitored. The large (but not as large as expected) speed bump seems to be working well, slowing traffic turning on to the High St and hopefully preventing more bumps. – The Wellmeadow and Croft Lane pea lights are now under review, PKC officers have been out and a plan was verbally agreed to replace the broken network. Unfortunately the first deadline and window of opportunity has already been missed but she said that they were hoping to have the old lights carefully removed from the trees before they started to bloom and have any pruning done before the new lights go up after the summer and to be connected to their respective junction boxes but it now looks like all the work will need to be done after the summer and before the clocks go back in October when the lights are due to be switched on for the winter. Looking at the town street furniture has also been on the to do list, upgrading, refurbishing or relocating seating areas; planters and bike rails have been</p>			

identified so we will shortly have seating that is correctly located and fit for purpose. A better number of suitably located bike parking rails, more appropriate to the volume of cyclists who visit the area and seats repositioned to enhance with better planting areas around them. The other towns won't stand a chance against Blair in Bloom next year! In a bid to have a better connected area, she said that she had been working with PKC to establish Wi-Fi hotspots, several of which have been rolled out, including at the Town Hall, the Recy and Rattray Connect and other PKC locations as well. New technology, already being used in Perth using street lamps to bounce a constant wireless signal, will hopefully be rolled out here in the near future. Parking is always a hot topic, no matter where you are, there is never enough of it, and we can't easily create more spaces here, but we can and have changed the times of on street parking from ½ to 1 hour which should encourage more people to stop for longer and enjoy the area. A surprisingly energetic act of vandalism last summer has put the wishing well out of commission which means that not only have we not been able to collect money but we have not been able to give any money out to local groups in the town which is a shame. We are still waiting for the Perspex box to be remade and repositioned in the well. Hopefully we won't have to wait too much longer. Finally the Oakbank Rd works have been completed (almost) - it has taken a long long time and many emails but 5 years on, the work is all but finished. Just the 2012 slip retaining wall is required to be reinforced. IR has been instrumental in ensuring the work was done and not allowing it to be forgotten by PKC and she thanked him. She said that BRCC has played an important part in ensuring that local voices have been heard when it comes to planning decisions and projects. From encouraging residents to come to consultations about the new Blackthorn Place residential development or the West Park development and hearing their opinions at our meetings or facilitating fact finding meetings about the new Recy. BRCC has been at the forefront of discussions about how the town is growing. PKC have ring-fenced £18 million for a new multi-disciplinary recreation centre which is due to be delivered by 2020. This is to service the whole of the BHS catchment area so careful planning is essential if it is to be successful and meet the growing needs of the community. 2017 saw us host another successful Open Day in the Town Hall, keeping our format of stalls, it was again attended by various groups, clubs, Live Active, PKC departments and this time as it is an election year, the prospective council candidates. The star of the show, however, was the corner dedicated to the new Recy plans. A steady stream of about 100 people visited throughout the day, which was in line with previous events, and people had the chance to ask all manner of questions directly to the relevant group or department. It is 2 years since the last Open Day and this gap seems to work well between events. Preparation is under way to bring more events to the town including a Music Festival, inspired by Hamish Henderson, a bonfire night with fireworks, a Christmas Nativity Scene and decorated Christmas or Yule tree to the Wellmeadow are also in the offing. We will also be welcoming back the Canadian Pipes and Drums in 2018 who will perform in the Wellmeadow and march through the town. We continue to nurture our links with many of the local groups and have helped to set up a few new ones; the Community Resilience Group, the Allotment Association, Climate Café, Keep Blairgowrie & Rattray Beautiful and the Cycle Path Network. All have members of BRCC leading and steering them to successful outcomes. She said that she didn't know if "out with old and in with the new" was appropriate given CS had been re-elected but the local elections had certainly changed the political landscape. Bob Ellis and Liz Grant have both stepped down and she said that in their place, she would like to welcome new councillors Bob Brawn and Tom McEwan. She hoped that BRCC could count on their support and enjoy a similar level of interaction and cooperation with them as with their colleagues in the past and she welcomed back Cllr Caroline Shiers as one of BRCC's most active and able representatives saying it was no surprise that she had been re-elected given how actively she supported our community. PKC officers could benefit from more public interaction as they seem to make much better decisions when they do. She hoped that BRCC could keep facilitating these exchanges and improving PKC's understanding of what the area needs. Police, Fire & Rescue. This is another area where things are all changed. The Fire service has a new station manager – Jake

Kitt – and a new Policing team headed up by Inspector Thomson & Sergeant McKeag. Attendance has been expectedly patchy as their teams settle in to their new roles and working patterns. Early signs are good that they are getting on with the job in hand and making good progress. She said that there are currently 3 vacancies on BRCC but our last Associate Young Member has disappointingly being absent for the last 7 months. Again, we would be looking to BHS in the new academic year to try to fill these empty spaces and hopefully this time we will be successful in attracting at last one new Young Member. In conclusion, our community council continues to go from strength to strength, identifying ways in which we can improve and/or enhance the town to make Blairgowrie & Rattray a better place. Our members actively (and fearlessly) take on any number of challenges and encourage others to get involved with them. Their dedication and wonderfully welcoming approach has been something that not only the town but I too have personally benefited from and she said she couldn't thank them enough for that. We continue to make steady progress within the area and the assistance received from our elected members has been invaluable and something that she hoped they could continue to rely on to effect positive change for the area. She also wanted to thank IR for writing the quarterly Hub magazine article, which keeps the community abreast of what BRCC is up to, so perfectly; PM for keeping the Minutes and figures in order and EF for spamming us on a fairly regular basis!! She also thanked CD of the Blairie for her excellent reporting of all BRCC's exploits and being such a supporter of all our work. She said that she passed on the position of Chair knowing that we will continue to pull in the same direction and continue to make improvements where we can. She thanked everyone for all their help and dedication over the last year.

Item 3 – Treasurer's Report.

PM read her financial report.
BRCC had income of £541 council grant (balance from prev. year £159), £38 from the Hamish Henderson film showing at the Community Campus and we collected £173 in the wishing well from April to August when it was vandalised (balance b/fd £170). The Resilience Group were also awarded funding of £8950 from SSE.

Outgoings were Hire of hall £83, stationery £142, upgrade to the Secretary's laptop £70, remembrance wreath £30, web services £29, Gifts £55, Sundries £63 and we donated £316 to the Braemar Day Committee. The expenses of the resilience Group so far were £917.

BS has bought a container costing £1644 so the B a/c now stands at £6389.

Item 4 – Secretary's Report.

<p>EF said that there are the same things repeated every month like dog poo and Castle Water parking, so but she had received a letter about Davie Park facilities and the upkeep of the park, which she had replied to. MY said that the feedback from the Town Hall Open Day was quite good and there were quite a few replies These would be covered a later meeting.</p>	
<p>Item 5 – Demit of current Office Bearers and election of new Office Bearers.</p> <p>MY said that the current office bearers would now stand down and invited CS to Chair the meeting pro tem so that new office bearers could be elected.</p> <p>CS thanked MY and said she would keep it very brief but said that for her it had been an enormous privilege working with the current Community Council and in particular with the office bearers especially Chair MY who had been fantastic. She said that when BRCC was re-formed 3½ years ago, all of the community councillors were new and there was a huge “to-do” list which has been successfully tackled although there have been other things added to the end of it. Watching the way that PKC has changed the way that they interact with the community as a result of BRCC’s efforts would probably be MY’s biggest legacy and she said that speaking to other communities elsewhere, they are quite jealous of the way that BRCC has cracked that interaction with PKC officers. So well done and keep it going. She then asked for nominations for Chair.</p> <p>EF was proposed by MY, this was seconded by IR and this was agreed unanimously. EF accepted the position and took the Chair for the rest of the meeting.</p> <p>EF asked for nominations for the position of Vice Chair. IR was proposed by BS, this was seconded by PM and this was agreed unanimously. IR accepted the position.</p> <p>EF asked for nominations for the position of Treasurer. PM was proposed by MY, this was seconded by AD and this was agreed unanimously. PM accepted the position.</p> <p>EF asked for nominations for the position of Secretary. SN was proposed by IR, this was seconded by BS and this was agreed unanimously. SN accepted the position.</p>	
<p>Item 6 – Minute Taker.</p> <p>PM said that she would not be able to take the minutes in September/October and wished someone else to take over. Louise Littlejohn was shadowing the meeting this month and would return next month and take minutes alongside PM and compare notes thereafter. She would decide after that whether she wanted the position.</p>	
<p>Item 7 - Adoption of minutes.</p> <p>EF asked if there were any alterations proposed to the AGM minutes of May 2016. There were none and approval was proposed by IC seconded by IR. Approval of the April minutes was proposed by AD seconded by MY. Both carried unanimously.</p>	
<p>Item 8 - Subjects raised by members of the public.</p> <p>Nothing was raised.</p>	
<p>Item 9- Police & Fire reports.</p>	

<p>There was no one in attendance from Fire or Police.</p>	
<p>Item10 – Arising and Ongoing Issues.</p> <p>10.1 HEAT</p> <p>LS said that the project is Home Energy Advice Team for Rattray and the Glens and is up and running. There is a small team and they are getting out and about and meeting people which is what they need to do and getting themselves knowledgeable of the area. They had a launch at no 5 Davie Park for the more immediate neighbours, which seemed to go well. On 22 May there will be an Open day at Rattray Connect from 2.30 – 6.30. He said he would like to thank PKC for the use of 5 Davie Park and Rattray Connect. At no 5, the previous day, there were 2 people wanting home visits in the first hour. They had been concerned that, with the number of cold calls that people get promising to improve energy efficiency, they wanted this to be from the community outwards, to be seen as something that is local, free and impartial. He thanked CD for the almost full page article in the Blairie. They have managed to start quicker than expected and 5 weeks in, it is proving invaluable. The Mount Blair CC and Development Trust had been incredibly helpful and space has been provided in the Session House in Kirkmichael. He said that they cannot direct people to a supplier but give advice on ways to apply for funding.</p> <p>10.2 Discover Blairgowrie Update.</p> <p>EF read out the Discover Blairgowrie & One Voice report.</p> <p>B&R Transport Scheme Pilot (Transport & Isolation)</p> <p>Scheme went live on 1st May. Details of how to join are available on Discover Blairgowrie or contact Maggie Urquhart</p> <p>Volunteering & Job Opportunities</p> <p>10 opportunities listed on the website - this includes volunteer drivers. Feedback indicates that it may be better to make the application page more specific to the organisation. We will be working on this over the next few weeks.</p> <p>Co-op Community Fund</p> <p>The Co-op fund awarded £1817.95 towards the cost of setting up the Transport Scheme Pilot. A second project has been accepted – Memories in Mind. This is to retain local pictures, stories, family connections, etc for future generations. The information will be available to all members of the local community, their (extended) family and carers - unpaid and professional. It's amazing what a carrier bag and shopping in your local Co-op can do for your community!</p> <p>Hub Mag & Discover Blairgowrie</p> <p>Summer Magazine – deadline 26th May, delivery expected week 19th June. Focus is on summer activities during the school holiday as well as what is happening in the local community. Expect to update the What's On posters.</p> <p>Forum</p> <p>Next forum is Thursday 18th May in Angus Hotel at 5.30. This is open to everyone.</p> <p>Town Map</p>	

Draft A3 and A2 size maps under review, next step is to find sponsors and advertisers so we can print the map. The maps will be available free to visitors and locals from sites around the town.

10.3 Group Updates.

LS gave thanks for the support given to the Cycle Network and the letter written by MY. BS said that One Voice gave their support.

AD said that the new Christmas lights should arrive next Tuesday and the old ones are being recycled to Kirriemuir. The illuminations committee is meeting next week to do modifications, attach labels and there will be new lights in Rattray.

GD said that there was nothing to concern BRCC in the weekly lists. PM said that the PKC website weekly lists are not breaking down into local wards and CS said she would investigate.

SN said there had been no action on the points he had raised with Chic Haggart (PKC), the Living Streets report had not been published and nothing about the extension of the parking time limit and removal of some yellow lines. So with the new councillors in place they should collectively link arms and have a word with the officers concerned.

IR said that BRAN was making good progress and had been out on 6 work parties in the last week with AD being out 5 evenings. The paths are now in a very good condition. They are using the paths4all formula for value in kind and they are now up to £4.5 thousand since the start of February. They now have 40 odd members and like any voluntary group they have a hard core of workers and they will be out at the weekend on the CATERAN Trail near Ballintuim in preparation for the CATERAN YOMP. One of the comments they have received is that they are not communicating effectively and he asked CS for some contacts with the Loon Braes Parknership etc. IR thanked LS for arranging for Castle Huntly personnel to come on Monday and they will hopefully be talking about their willingness to cut the garden area at the back of the supervisor's bungalow at Davie Park. BRAN will then be able to work out how they will keep it maintained. They would also be talking to Helen McCann of Blair in Bloom but as always, the more work is done, the more is required. He also wanted to thank a lot of the local landowners and thought that their work was appreciated and the landowners were also out cutting back vegetation. BRAN had also been at Blair in Bloom's litter pick but he thought that the general level of litter is decreasing except for dog poo bags. He also wished to thank Lucy Garthwaite (PKC) and her teams for their work in replacing the dog waste bins with standard bins. EF said that the bike which was in the river has been removed.

PM said that there had been 19 nominations for eleven people for Citizen of the Year and 2 for one - Young person of the year. Judging would be the next day.

BS said that he & IR met with the Rights Respecting team from Newhill Primary School who want some way of moving what they do within the school to outwith the school as well. They had talks about what avenues that would take, one of which was a presence on the Discover Blairgowrie website. They really want to move forward to put the Rights, which they respect, out into the community. EF asked which age group they were and BS replied that it was P5 – P7. IR said that he found the group quite inspirational and their enthusiasm to get things changed was brilliant. They also recognise their Responsibilities going up to BHS – not to have a “brain dump” when they go there and lose their civic understanding.

<p>BS said that the Allotment Association had not yet signed a lease because the landowner hasn't had time to give it to their solicitors but was allowing the group on site so if anyone is interested in a plot or digging up a lot of roots contact him. EF asked if anyone had applied for an allotment yet and BS said not as yet because it only went live this week. The rent had been settled and they have not paid anything yet but could get going straight away. AD asked where the site was and BS said at Bramblebank/Westfield on a piece of ground between the two mills.</p> <p>Three of the the Riverside Venture Group (RVG), (2 of which are BRAN members) had a meeting and thought that they had come to an agreement about the things they are able to do. However the idea of cutting back the riverside vegetation has been vetoed. PKC quoted the policy for riverside safety but BS has looked this up and it says that there should be a small verge with "long grass" to create an edge. It does not however specify what length the grass should be. Paul Summers (PKC) has knocked it back completely. IR said they had wanted to cut back the young saplings between the seats and the river and to strim the vegetation to give people a nice view of the river which is what they want to see but this is not enough to satisfy PKC at the moment.</p> <p>BS also said that while they were there, he counted 22 cars in the Riverside car park, 2 of them double parked and a person had to park on the verge on the hill as there were no more spaces. EF said that she parked there last week and spoke to several people and there was no one in favour of cutting it back, they liked the tall grass and wild flowers. The banking could be worked on in sections, deweeded then reseeded. DC asked which parts PKC maintain and which do local organisations maintain. IR replied that PKC only cut the flat area. DC said that the car park in Balmoral Rd used to be maintained but not now. IR said that the plan was to have a landscaped rockery garden at the Cuttle Burn but it would be a lot of work. There was considerable debate about Castle Water and the general lack of desire to walk any distance to work from where the car is parked, instead of parking in a community car park. CS agreed to go back to Castle Water although it is not just their employees who are causing the problem. TM said that whatever measures are introduced, there is still the problem of enforcing them. SN suggested that before a future meeting with PKC officers about the strimming etc. that the RVG look at the relevant Economic Development Policy as because of the diverse nature of the local Local Authority and the diversity of the departments, it is extremely unlikely that the officers you speak to will be are aware of the general policies which drive the Council and it might be worthwhile to start a meeting by saying that Council Policy for Blairgowrie is about driving Tourism etc thus ensure that it is not taken as criticism.</p>	<p>CS</p>
<p>Item 11 - Local Councillor reports.</p> <p>BB asked for BRCC members' patience as he was very new to the job and it was a steep learning curve.</p> <p>TM said that he had been attending community council meetings for the last year and he found that there was great enthusiasm for the job. It is not difficult to work with BRCC and he was looking forward to working with BRCC.</p> <p>CS said that she was looking forward to working with the other 2 local councillors and to continue that honesty but there were no easy fixes for a lot of the problems. The planning application for Blackthorn Place is expected shortly and while there had been some tweaks, they were not as many as she would have liked. She suggested that a meeting be arranged with the 3 councillors, 2 of BRCC, representatives of the local community and Lorna Cameron PKC and Stuart Milne Ltd to go through it again. Davie park pavilion is needing to be brought up to standard. Daryl McKeown (PKC) came through to a meeting about Hatton Rd before the last meeting and she would get back to him again about this and other safety issues in Rattray. There had been a request for the 20mph to be extended from Haugh Rd up to the High St in Rattray because now that there is no parking beside the school, the</p>	<p>CS</p>

<p>traffic speeds have crept up a bit. SN said that these issues were highlighted in the Living Streets walkabout but the report is a long time coming. Other points raised were overgrowing hedges, forcing pedestrians to walk on the road, huge groups of motor cyclists and lots of children walking to school. PM asked if the priority of the crossroads at Bonnington Rd/ Hatton Rd could be changed as it would help exiting from lower Bonnington Rd to continue up to Drimmie and this would also slow the traffic down on Hatton Rd.</p>	
<p>Item 12– Pending Planning Applications.</p> <p>There were no relevant planning applications.</p>	
<p>Item 13– Secretary’s Correspondence.</p> <p>The Pharmacy who wanted to speak to BRCC about West Park Development will be at the next meeting.</p>	
<p>Item 14 - Chair’s report on follow ups since last meeting.</p> <p>MY said she had a meeting with the Invest in Perth team to try and find out what the plan for Blairgowrie is vis a vis the West Park development and the space which is prime development land on Hatton Rd – what is their vision for the town – how do they see it developing – what kind of businesses are they trying to attract to the town and she said she couldn’t say how disappointed she was with the whole meeting. Their response was “there is no plan”. Their priority was just attract businesses of any size to Perthshire. It would have been nice for them to know a bit about the town and what is needed, where the gaps are, namely leisure, recreation and entertainment. We are fine for houses! We need to highlight that this is where people would choose to live – promote our housing market and get it moving. She said she was particularly irked to see that Perth is spending £12M on lighting. She said, if the meeting would like to see the “City of Light Action Plan”, she had a wonderfully, expensively printed vision. PKC intend to build a pedestrian bridge and pedestrianise Tay St between the bridges which will only add to the congestion. She said that BRCC need to explain to them that their decisions about Perth City have a really big ripple effect on the rest of Perthshire; when people stop coming to Perthshire, they start going elsewhere. Blairgowrie relies on tourism and if people start thinking, I really can’t be bothered trying to negotiate Perth, can’t get parked, whatever, then they say, let’s go to Falkirk, Edinburgh, Forfar. EF said that she had been meaning to go to Perth one day but decided that she couldn’t be bothered trying to negotiate the Inveralmond Roundabout roadworks. MY said that was what happened in Blairgowrie when the traffic lights affected so many people, people just went to Forfar or somewhere else and it has been really difficult to change that shopping habit – they have discovered that there is free parking in Forfar and there’s lots of big shops. She said that Perth need to be more responsible about what they are doing in the area because it affects all of us. She said she was annoyed about the amount of money wasted- on so much rubbish. Where these lights are to be and the images they are to project on the ground – this is supposed to be an attraction? EF said she had spoken to Culture Perth and mentioned the festival that is held in Durham which attracts hundreds of thousands of people and MY replied that it is only on at Durham for 4 nights and not for an extended period. Perth are spending £12m on lights and we can’t get our pea lights functioning properly! MY said if Blairgowrie could get hold of some of the tourism business from people attending events in Perth, that would be great but again we need parking and facilities and something to do when they are not at whatever they came for. If PKC keep giving away land to residential developments, then there will be no spaces left within the town centre catchment to attract anyone in. It will all be on the periphery. CS said that following the local elections, there were new councillors and there would be new people at the top and it would be a good opportunity, as soon as the appointments are made, to invite them to meet BRCC and</p>	

<p>these points could be made directly to them. The last 5 years' strategy has been to invest in Perth and "if Perth is right everything else will fall into place". That clearly hasn't worked. The same conversations are heard in Kinross, in Crieff, in Auchterarder. It would be a good time to make these points directly. TM said that one of the first emails he received was from the Chief Executive saying that as he was a new member, he wanted to come & visit his ward. EF asked if with the change in councillors if it was the "same old, same old" and SN said no because the Council officers may be the same but they are implementing the decisions of the Councillors. CS said that all the political groups going into the election set out their priorities and rural communities were quite high up the priorities of the different groups.</p>	
<p>Item 15– AOCB.</p> <p>AD asked who gave permission for the shows in Davie Park and CS replied PKC. AD said that they should be made to take down all the posters that they have put up. AD said that Corryard have removed all the shuttering from the Hill Primary building and left the building open, after a few weeks work, to vermin and vandals. He had heard a rumour that the infant school building was going to be used by Castle water and CS would check. IC asked about the proposed 63 bus timetable change and PM replied that there had been no further communication from PKC since they said they would start on 3 July. There was some conversation about bus shelters, lack of, and CS said there was a waiting list with refurbished ones being made available. IC said he would put timetables through doors on GCR when they became available. BS said that at the last meeting he had offered to post the invitations to the neighbour consultation meeting about the Recy and MY replied that Penny Lochhead (PL) had confirmed the date only today and she would send the letter to BS and he could print it out and deliver to the neighbours The meeting will be about the specific issues they may have such as noise, lights, access etc. PL had been up at the Recy from 7am to 10pm and lots of people had seen the consultation.</p>	CS
